



Cranbrook Japanese Garden Bench

This solid mahogany bench was hand-crafted in Mark Baker's Ann Arbor studio using Japanese hand tools and traditional joinery techniques. Designed by Sadafumi Uchiyama and detailed by Mark Baker exclusively for use in the Cranbrook Japanese Garden, this is your opportunity to have an identical authorized bench in your own garden!

Milled from rough-hewn wood, the boards were shaped and smoothed using Japanese hand planes to feature and preserve the fine, straight grain of the wood. Hand-cut mortise and tenons provide strength while mahogany's natural durability makes it a perfect piece of furniture for a patio or garden.

Mark Baker is a furniture maker and designer with nearly two decades of experience creating furniture, exhibitions, and specialized collections care solutions for private clients and cultural institutions. He is a 2011 graduate of Cranbrook Academy of Art and operates a design/build studio in Ann Arbor.

Sadafumi Uchiyama is the Curator Emeritus of the Portland Japanese Garden in Oregon. Since 2018, he has been working with the Cranbrook Center designing and guiding the rejuvenation of the Cranbrook Japanese Garden. He lives and works in both Portland and Japan where he has a home on the northern island of Hokkaidō.

The bench measures 54 inches long and has a seat height of 17-1/2 inches. The mahogany is unfinished and will naturally 'gray' when exposed to the elements.

Take home this specialty collection that supports the Center and highlights Cranbrook's enduring legacy in the world of design.


The floor mirror measures 80 inches high and the candle holders measure 13 inches high.

"Swedish Grace" Watercolor Rug

This stunning rug, and inspiration behind the A Winter's Tale theme, was designed by Rut "Ruth" Elisabeth Ingvarsson—an important textile designer, teacher, and weaver for Studio Loja Saarinen at Cranbrook. Born in 1897 in Glemminge, Skäne, Sweden, Ingvarsson studied at the celebrated weaving studio of Märta Måås-Fjetterström in Båstad, Sweden, where she developed great skill painting watercolor sketches on graph paper in the popular "Swedish Grace" (or "Swedish Modern") style.


In late 1929, Ruth Ingvarsson immigrated to America to start work that December at Studio Loja Saarinen, Cranbrook's weaving workshop. Here, Ingvarsson executed designs from Loja herself and other members of the Saarinen family. Later, Ingvarsson would go on to teach weaving at Kingswood, as well as the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts and Wayne State University.

Before passing in 1969, Ingvarsson left her manuscripts, sketchbooks, and other materials to Lee Morrell, who donated them to Cranbrook Archives in 1997. Included in these manuscripts is this beautiful watercolor in the "Swedish Grace" style from the 1930s. To our knowledge, the illustrated textile design was never woven. Until now. The Center is working closely with Suzanne Hagopian and Edmond Hagopian, grandchildren of textile impresario Haroutun "Harry" Hagopian, to create an adaptation of Ingvarsson's stunning watercolor. The new hand-dyed and handwoven rug is expected to be completed in the summer of 2025.

The rug, which will measure approximately 5 by 7 feet, will be available for pickup at Hagopian World of Rugs in Birmingham; it may be shipped for an additional fee.



NEW ENTRANCE GARDEN PROJECT

This year's Paddle Raise celebrates the work Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research is doing to rejuvenate the Cranbrook Japanese Garden. The Cranbrook Japanese Garden is among the oldest Japanese-style gardens in North America. Created in 1915 as a part of the country estate of Cranbrook's founders George and Ellen Booth, this one-acre, pond-style strolling garden is located at the eastern edge of Kingswood Lake, midway between Cranbrook House and Cranbrook Kingswood Upper School. The garden, centered on the Lily Pond and its two small islands, features an iconic vermillion Japanese-style bridge, the original 1915 Kasuga Lantern, and the recently rehabilitated Lily Pond Cascade with a new Mountain Lantern (yamadoro). Open all year, daily from dawn to dusk, the Cranbrook Japanese Garden is a popular destination for Cranbrook visitors, who come to explore the idealized representation of nature.

Although the garden is a place of beauty, solace, and inspiration, further rehabilitation will ensure future generations can enjoy the space for years to come. Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research commissioned Sadafumi Uchiyama, Curator Emeritus and former Director of the International Garden Training Center at the Portland Japanese Garden in Oregon, to design the master plan for the rejuvenation of the Cranbrook Japanese Garden.

Completed in 2019 and updated in 2022, the plan respects the integrity and historic features of the Booth-era landscape while also enhancing its significance as a Japanese-style garden. Uchiyama's master plan for the Cranbrook Japanese Garden also moves forward the Center's commitment to inclusion, diversity, equity, and access by increasingly making the garden accessible to all, no matter their physical abilities.

The creation of the New Entrance Garden is the second phase of the multi-phase master plan. The New Entrance Garden will feature an Azumaya pavilion, a new pathway with stone steps leading down into the garden where the original Kasuga Lantern is located, and a long wooden bench inspired by the Ryoanji stone garden in Kyoto. Funds raised through the 2025 House Party Paddle Raise will allow the Center to begin construction on the New Entrance Garden this spring.

- 5. All auction items are subject to the terms stipulated by the donors as stated in the item description or on any certificate(s) or gift cards presented to the guest upon payment. The buyer assumes all responsibility for redeeming the item within the period specified. The Center is not a representative of the auction item donor and is unable to request modifications or extensions of any item's terms on behalf of the buyer.
- 6. All items are to be used at the buyer's discretion. A House Party at Cranbrook, Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research, Cranbrook Educational Community, and their affiliates shall be held harmless from any liability resulting from the use of any winning item.
- 7. Payment for all auction items and paddle raises must be received no later than February 28, 2025.
- 8. Pick-up and/or delivery specifications for each item are noted in the item description and exceptions.
- 9. If a buyer requests that an item be shipped, it may be shipped for an additional fee. Every effort will be made to ship or deliver that item to the buyer in a timely fashion.
- 10. Sales tax up to the fair market value of an auction item will be added on tangible items, goods, and services that would typically be taxable.
- 11. Bid amounts over an auction item's stated fair market value are tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law and are not subject to sales tax.
