

Designed by the Swedish weaver and Studio Loja Saarinen supervisor Maja Andersson Wirde, the 1931 *George Booth Office Carpet/Museum Rug* was alternately used in the offices of the Cranbrook Foundation and the galleries of Cranbrook Art Museum. The original rug, which remains in beautiful condition, is in the collection of the Art Museum.

Michigan-based photographer James Haefner has been photographing automobiles, architecture, and design for over forty years. Since graduating from Rochester Institute of Technology in New York in 1976, Haefner has worked to create dynamic imagery for commercial and nonprofit clients. For the award-winning book *Michigan Modern: An Architectural Legacy*, Haefner spent three years photographing significant structures around the state, including architecturally rich Cranbrook. This past winter, he worked with the Center for Collections and Research to photograph all the existing Studio Loja Saarinen rugs in the Art Museum and Cultural Properties collections.

This is your chance to make a bold statement and bring the acclaimed "Knoll look" into your living room! Florence Knoll Bassett (1917–2019) was a leading force in modern design—and one of the first graduates of Kingswood School for Girls. She worked at what became Knoll International from 1943 to 1965, first as a business partner with her first husband, Hans Knoll, later as president after the death of Hans Knoll, and, finally, as design director.

Among Knoll's most celebrated projects are the interiors she designed for Eero Saarinen's buildings, including the General Motors Technical Center, in Michigan, and the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) Offices, in New York. Her furniture commissions—including Eero Saarinen's *Womb* and *Tulip Chairs* and Harry Bertoia's *Diamond Chair*—became hallmarks of the modern era. Knoll herself designed classics that remain in production today, most notably her classic 1954 *Coffee Table*.

Cranbrook is where Knoll's career began. Born in Saginaw, Michigan, Florence Schust enrolled as a boarding student at Kingswood School for Girls when it opened its doors in 1931. Even before she graduated in 1934, her talent as a designer caught the attention of Eliel Saarinen, who introduced Knoll to Loja, Pipsan, and Eero, and encouraged her to begin her formal education in architecture and design at Cranbrook Academy of Art. The rest of the story is design history!

Bring the grace and beauty of the Kingswood Dining Room home with you! In the late 1920s, George Booth commissioned the young and precocious Eero Saarinen to design all the furnishings for Kingswood School for Girls. Barely out of his teens, Eero's designs (all circa 1929 – 1931) ranged from the Egyptian-revival benches in the Green Lobby to the radically modern, tubular steel armchairs in the Auditorium. His most striking design—and the one fondly remembered by everyone that has studied or dined in the school—is the *Dining Hall Chair*.

This handsome Art Deco chair features tapered legs and a curved crest rail inspired by classic nineteenth-century Scandinavian designs. The chairs will be reproduced—accurate in every detail, including the color of the original pink paint—by the expert Michigan-based craftsman Anthony Ruzzin. The seats will be covered with a coordinated solid upholstery by MaryLou Ruzzin.

Guiding Anthony Ruzzin as he carefully crafts these reproductions is an original *Dining Hall Chair* loaned to him from the Center's Cultural Properties collection. Working side-by-side with a ninety-year-old original will ensure the authenticity of the reproduced chair—the ultimate memento of Kingswood School Cranbrook.

The chairs are not available to the general public and are being offered exclusively to House Party 2022 patrons. The chairs will be stamped and dated as a "Cranbrook Authorized Reproduction," lest you ever be accused of pilfering a chair from Kingswood!

When Gerhardt Knodel arrived at Cranbrook in his Karmann Ghia in 1970, straight from sunny Los Angeles, he embarked on a career that would revolutionize the fields of fiber and textiles. His studio practice now spans over 50 years, 37 of them invested as Artist-in-Residence and Head of the Fiber Department, then Director, and now Director Emeritus of Cranbrook Academy of Art.

Experience a major exhibition of Knodel's drawings, fiber artwork, and mixed-media objects in *Minglings: A Journey Across Time*, on view at the Flint Institute of Arts. Inspired by a tapestry remnant from China's Ming Dynasty, Knodel embarked on an exploration into the potential of how this fabric from another time and place could inform his present work. Your exploration of *Minglings* will be guided by exhibition curator Sarah Kohn and include a wine reception hosted by Director of Donor Relations (and Academy of Art 1974 Ceramics Department graduate) Kathryn Sharbaugh.

Whether it's before or after your visit to Flint, the highlight of this experience will be the conversation you will enjoy with the artist in his stunning, multi-level Pontiac studio. You and your guests will learn about Knodel's remarkable career, from the grand installations he made for institutions around the world to the inspiration he draws from his vast collection of world textiles. You will leave with a passion for fiber!

Bring a piece of Cranbrook history into your living room with this remarkable rug! In 1934, the Saarinen family created "Room for a Lady" for one of the decade's most important design exhibitions, *Contemporary American Industrial Arts* at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Restaged in the Cranbrook Pavilion (now St. Dunstan's) the following year, the room ensemble included Eliel's iconic globular coffee urn, an evening gown by Pipsan, early *moderne* furniture by Eero—and Loja's stunning black and white rug.

This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity! The Center will be working closely with Edmond Hagopian and Suzanne Hagopian, grandchildren of Haroutun "Harry" Hagopian, to create a handmade adaptation of this timeless contemporary rug. Approximately two thirds of the original dimensions, the carpet is expected to be completed in the winter of 2023.

The adaptation will be based on fragments of the original rug, an early reproduction, and vintage photographs of the rug in the Cranbrook Pavilion exhibition in the collection of Cranbrook Archives.



HOUSE PARTY 2022 PADDLE RAISE

Cranbrook Textiles Care Fund

Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research is committed to sharing Cranbrook's history and legacy with audiences near and far. This work includes preserving and restoring Cranbrook's campus-wide collection of Cultural Properties—the gates and sculptures on the grounds, the furniture in the historic houses and schools, and the textiles that define Cranbrook's historic interiors.

With a collection of nearly 10,000 objects, this is an enormous task, one that requires both the time and attention of the Center's professional staff—and the resources they need to care for these treasures. The House Party 2022 Paddle Raise will allow the Center to proceed with three critical projects that promise to bring back to life the textiles Loja Saarinen designed for Cranbrook.

IF YOU HELP THE CENTER RAISE \$40,000+

The Center will reproduce the original curtains Loja Saarinen designed for the Second Floor Hallway Seating Alcove in Saarinen House.

With inlay patterns inspired by Finnish folk textiles, these translucent curtains will be rewoven by Paula Stebbins Becker (CAA MFA in Fibers, 1993) in the Kingswood Weaving Studio on an original Cranbrook Loom. Students at Cranbrook Schools will have an opportunity to be a part of the process. The first \$5,000 of this \$15,000 project has already been raised with a grant from Finlandia Foundation National.

The Center will use \$10,000 to establish a fund for the reproduction of the rug Loja Saarinen designed for the Kingswood Rose Lobby, between the Dining Hall and the Auditorium.

Rug No. 31 was woven on the largest of the Studio Loja Saarinen looms, which had a width of 12 feet. While the original 1931 rug survives in the collection of Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research, it is too fragile to be used in the space. The reproduction would be created with daily use in mind. The remainder of the funds needed for this Center-led project, estimated to cost at least \$50,000, will be raised by Cranbrook Schools.

The Center will embark on a pilot project to recreate the curtains that Loja Saarinen designed for the Cranbrook House Library.

The Center's Cultural Properties include a pair of curtains for the small window in the Cranbrook House Library behind the piano. Recent research has matched these curtains, with their cream and rust-colored embroidery, to a 1937 inventory noting they were made by "L. Saarinen." The project would begin with the reproduction of these curtains and expand, with additional funding, to the curtains for the three larger Library windows.

HOUSE PARTY 2021 PADDLE RAISE

Cranbrook Collections Care Fund

THE HOUSE PARTY 2021 COLLECTIONS CARE FUND IS SUPPORTING THE FOLLOWING CENTER-LED PROJECTS ACROSS CRANBROOK'S CAMPUS:

- Restoration of the original Cranbrook Press. George Booth used this 2,000-pound Lion Reliance hand press, which he purchased in 1900, to establish the Cranbrook Press in the attic of the Detroit Evening News building in Detroit. When restored, the press will be returned to active use by Cranbrook Upper School and Academy of Art students. The restoration will be undertaken by Brian Murphy, who recently restored a similar press for Wayne State University. (\$14,250)
- 2 Creation of conservation-quality storage boxes for the Cranbrook Archives collection of twelve titles printed by the Cranbrook Press. The Center is working with Bohemio Bookbindery in Ann Arbor on this project. (\$2,375)
- Conservation of Jessie Bayes's 1920 Coffer, an ornate Arts and Crafts treasure purchased by George Booth at the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts. Carved, painted, and gilded, the coffer's form is based on medieval strongboxes used for keeping money or valuables safe. The coffer is at the Intermuseum Conservation Association in Cleveland, where it will be conserved. (\$10,937)
- 4 Conservation and digitization of the Cranbrook Institute of Science August 1930 film, Walpole Island. This film, which was shot on an important First Nations site in Ontario, will be incorporated into both the Institute's and Center's educational programming and serve as the pilot for the conservation of eight more Institute films in the Archives' collection. (\$2,800)

In 2021, Cranbrook Center for Collections and Research hosted an enormously successful virtual fundraiser, *A Global House Party at Cranbrook Celebrating Carl Milles*. The evening, which included the world premiere of the Center's first film, *Carl Milles: Beauty in Bronze*, ended with a live virtual auction and paddle raise. With gifts totaling \$36,796, the House Party 2021 Paddle Raise established the Cranbrook Collections Care Fund. - Completion of the conservation and reinstallation of Julius Schmidt's Cannon on the Academy of Art campus, outside the entrance to Dorm No. 2. The Center has been working with Academy graduate Adam Shirley (MFA in Metalsmithing, 2010) on this project. (\$640)
- 6 Restoration and repair of wood veneers on the Eliel Saarinendesigned furniture in Saarinen House. This work, which was completed in May 2022, was done by furniture conservator Mark Gervasi. (\$220)
- Conservation of selected works on paper in the Center's Archives and Cultural Properties collections. This work will be based on an examination of 192 drawings and documents to be conducted during a two-day visit in June 2022 by a conservator from the Northeast Document Conservation Center in Massachusetts. Priority will be placed on George Booth's original drawings for Cranbrook's architecture and decorative arts. The examination fee (\$6,600) will be paid out of the Center's operating budget. The conservation of selected works on paper will be funded through the balance of the House Party 2021 Collections Care Fund. (\$5,574)






Auction Rules


